Tutor Group 3C


3C have been making the most of the educational opportunities presented to them, this term. The class recently participated in the Hillingdon Young Citizens event hosted by Brunel University.

In terms of class work, some students have been working on a learning target related to the order of decimals and it has been lovely to see their progress.

Tutor Group VBC B

The students had an amazing time preparing the flowers and an even better time giving them out. Lots of smiles all round!




Eco-Committee








Whole School Activity Days

Science Day

Science day kicked off with a morning assembly full of lively songs and video's about Science and the different experiments and activities that schools around the country were doing for Science week this year.

The theme for Science week was Change and Adapt so I looked at a variety of resources and activities to reflect the theme.

Pathway 1 classes had 6 activities which were all centered around the theme. Deep Sea Yoga, learning all about the different fish in the ocean. Paperchain Caterpillars which taught the students about the lifecycle of a butterfly. Magnetic Challenge a fun activity which gave the students to explore what magnets can do with the support from adults. Music Maker was an opportunity to look at how different sounds are made. The last activity they did was to make Ice cream which again was an opportunity to watch ingredients turn into something quite yummy to eat.

These activities were class based and didn't require the students to transition around the school instead they were mostly teacher led activities with support from Julie Critchfield for Yoga and Erika for Music. This was based on the feedback received after last year's Science day when it was difficult to transition students .

Pathway 2 and 3 classes activities again were all centred around the theme, for this the students transitioned around the school. There were 6 adults involved in running activities, Nickie Grieves ran wormery groups with LIVE worms, it went down really well with the students to make wormeries! Charmaine ran groups to make footprint tunnels, an opportunity for the students to make tunnels put their tunnels in the garden and come back to them to look at the animal pawprints and then to guess which animals they could be. Robert ran Bath bomb Challenge an opportunity to make Bath bombs and to try them out by taking them home. Sue Donaldson ran groups making Amazing Animal Adaptations out of Junk materials, making amazing animals. Sarah Jane ran a Camouflaged Caterpillar Challenge hiding pieces of wool caterpillar length outside for the students to find. Clare ran Balloon Magic where the students had the opportunity to watch balloons inflate with the aid of a mixture of vinegar and Bicarbonate of Soda .

The day ended as it began with an Assembly, where we were able to all enjoy a PPt presentation made by Nicole Rossie's where she was able to share the highlights of the day. The whole day was packed full of activities and was a great success.

<u>Jubilee Year</u>



Shrove Tuesday


On Shrove Tuesday students and staff enjoyed homemade pancakes in school.

<u>Flame</u>



Autism Awareness Week


